What is Heartbleed?

Heartbleed allows an attacker to anonymously download a random chunk of memory from a server. This means they can get unencrypted passwords, and low-level encryption keys that protect your account... not to mention that an attacker might be able to access any part of the website (or data that you post into that site). How does this affect normal people? It affects anyone, and I do mean anyone, that logs into a website with a username and password.

This leak allows hackers to capture that information and they can then log into your account and get any information available under your account. So if that account has addresses, credit card numbers, social security numbers, etc. a hacker could have access to all of it. Examples of sites that might have this formation are bank sites, ebay, Amazon, retail store sites.

Users of any website that has personal information are advised to test out the domain name of that website on a heart bleed test site. If it comes back as safe, go ahead and change your password. Why you might ask? Because this hole has been exposed for years and just because the web site has already fixed it does not mean some hacker does not already have your details. If the site is not safe, call them to find out when it will be fixed.

Mental health crisis training offered for Oklahoma law enforcement

Senate sends 'doc fix' to Obama

Author: 25 percent of those seeking help for mental illness go to their church first

More than 15 Senate Republicans joined most Democrats in passing a bill that prevents a pending cut to [Medicare](#) physician rates.

Twenty five percent of people who have sought treatment or help for mental illness have gone to their [church](#) first, according to Amy Simpson, author of "Troubled Minds and the Church's Mission."

On a 64-35 vote Monday, the Senate cleared the House-passed 13-month "doc fix." In order to get agreement to hold the vote, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) held final passage to a 60-vote threshold.

Simpson was one of 10 featured speakers at "The Gathering on Mental Health and the Church" that was held in Lake Forest, Calif. on Friday, March 28. She also said that 98 percent of church leaders have seen some type of mental illness in their congregation, but only 12.5 percent of churches promote an atmosphere where mental illness is openly talked about.

"While I'm pleased with this temporary patch, I hope it's our last patch," Reid said ahead of the vote.
